
Purpose:

The purpose of this informational item is to provide the board with LSSU's enrollment by category and program over the last ten years in order to provide context for reports and initiatives discussed in other items contained in today's agenda.

Background:

Student counts used in this report are "persisting" students. Persisting students are those students that enroll and persist to the end of any given term.

The tracking of student enrollments has been crucial to the estimation of revenue. The Business Office tracks students in three distinct groups: continue (or returning) students, new students, and high-school students. The following graph shows the enrollment in those groups over the last ten years as well as the total enrollment.

Degree-seeking student enrollments have declined by 37% over the last ten years. This value is consistent with the decreases seen in continuing and new student counts. A more in-depth look at the data by group, rank, and full-time status is included in Appendix A. A report of enrollment by program is included in Appendix B.

The issue: We are not recruiting enough degree-seeking students to backfill the students that are leaving.

In September of 2022, as we planned for fall 2023, a model was used to generate the estimated number of returning students. The model removed the number of students that were planning to graduate, added the number of new students expected for the winter, spring, and summer semesters, and yielded the estimated number of returning students for fall 2023 to be 975. At this point the number of non-retained students was known (estimated) to be 600 students; 340 graduates and 260 not retained. Although, not specifically stated, this analysis does show that campus admission's efforts would have needed to generate 600 new students to break even on enrollment. This would be about 120 during the winter, spring, and summer semesters and 480 for the fall semester. Substantially more new students would be necessary in order to establish long-term growth.

In May of 2023, after discussion at SMT, a reasonable new student goal of 477 was established for fall 2023. This would have resulted in a fall 2023 enrollment of 1,452 (down from 1,461 for fall 2022).

Looking Toward FY25:

The number of seniors enrolled in FY24 is greater than the number enrolled in FY23. FY23 saw 341 graduates, therefore we should expect at least 340 of the seniors to graduate in FY24. Additionally, there are about 60 fewer students today than there were last fall. LSSU will begin to map out strategies for FY25, examine retention rates, launch new programs and recruitment initiatives, and set enrollment goals, and clearly articulate those goals to the campus.

Conclusion:

While it is important to acknowledge the decline in enrollment over the last decade, it is equally important to look forward. In the attached reports you will find:

- Budget details for FY24 that include two phases to work toward a balanced budget.
- An update on the upcoming Higher Learning Commission Focus visit that includes information on enrollment initiatives through new programming and target markets.
- Key initiatives for Fall 2024 recruitment contained in the Enrollment Management Report.
- Key retention initiatives as outlined in the Student Affairs Report.

Additionally, in the November meeting of the Board of Trustees, we will provide information on a new structure for marketing that should result in greater visibility of our outstanding academic programs and an update on the Prison Education initiative.

The following table shows the percent of degree-seeking students when compared to the entire student population. This has been fairly consistent over the last ten years. This is important due to the tuition differences between the populations.

18 years of LSSU enrollment data was examined. In times of stable or growing enrollment, the percent of freshman in the student population was generally 28% or higher and seniors generally made up less than 34% of the student population. This has not occurred since fall 2011.
