What is an Unsung Hero?




Why Your Students Should Attend






With a dedicated staff, thriving extracurriculars, and new leadership, the school continues to grow and excel. A key factor in this success has been the leadership of new superintendent Mark Church, whose positivity and support have contributed to staff retention and fostered a joyful atmosphere throughout the school.

The year began on a strong note with impressive staff retention, an outstanding football season, and the introduction of a new soccer team led by former professional player and former superintendent, Dave Patterson. The community has rallied around the school, as seen in the highly successful Homecoming parade organized by Graham Church and Sean Patterson.

A notable new addition this year is the TeeHee Team, founded by Kellie Love. Despite a modest budget, the staff club has made a significant impact by celebrating staff milestones and offering support during difficult times. Their introduction of secret staff spirit days has added a fun twist-Thanksgiving break kicked off with teachers arriving in full Christmas attire, much to the amusement (and confusion) of students.

Charlton Heston Academy continues to offer diverse and enriching extracurricular activities. The elementary flag football program, led by Coach Chris Palazzolo, remains a favorite among younger students. Meanwhile, Ann Marie John's Girls Empowerment Society is flourishing, providing 5th-grade girls with meaningful experiences such as visits to the Roscommon County Courthouse and a trip to the Nutcracker ballet at Interlochen. 
