School Index Summary

The Michigan School Index System is a school accountability reporting system used to identify schools for the federal school support categories defined in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). Michigan's Approved ESSA State Plan organizes schools identified for support into three groups: TSI, ATS, & CSI. MDE's Office of Partnership Districts will provide three levels of support to districts with partnership agreements – Intensive, Essential, and Fundamental. MDE's Office of Educational Supports will provide a basic level of support to districts that have schools identified for CSI and ATS that are not in a partnership agreement. Districts with schools only identified for TSI will be assisted through universal support provided to districts by MDE and through their ISDs.

What is a Partnership District?

Under the Every Student Succeeds Act of 2015 (ESSA), states must identify their lowest-performing schools for school improvement interventions. In Michigan, these schools are identified based on either a School Index score in the bottom 5% of the state or a high school graduation rate below 67% of students. Michigan's Consolidated State Plan for ESSA requires MDE to identify schools for the Partnership Model every three years. Districts that have at least one Partnership school, labeled Partnership districts, are required to create an improvement plan for schools in the district called the Partnership Agreement. Districts write and develop these Partnership Agreements in concert with their ISDs, MDE, and district partners. The Agreements include improvement goals for schools in the district, how districts plan on reaching those goals, and how districts will intervene if schools do not reach their improvement goals.

How Partnership with MDE Supports Classified Schools

- MDE develops partnership agreements with the goal of improving achievement levels at the lowest-performing schools in Michigan.
- With multiple partners at the table (ISD/RESA, Academy Admin, MDE Partnership Rep, and Charter School Rep, in addition to others), districts identify a plan of support and interventions that will improve student outcomes while prioritizing academic outcomes.
- This partnership allows MDE and the local ISD/RESA to provide financial support to fund the plan of support and interventions.
- Partnership meetings are held monthly and focus on accountability and support.
- The Office of Partnership Districts (OPD) is dedicated to providing timely and targeted, comprehensive research-based support to the state's lowest-performing schools and districts. Through increased collaboration, the purpose of the partnership is to reduce barriers and identify appropriate resources to help expedite the district's academic achievement for all students.

How the LSSU Charter Schools Office Supports Schools

Universal Support: All Schools

- LSSU CSO provides targeted support that is aligned with academic, special education, and whole-child priorities to strengthen PSA effectiveness.
- Support focuses on improving instruction, ensuring quality special education, and meeting all learners' needs, emphasizing growth over compliance.
- Efforts are guided by annual data to deliver high-quality professional learning in instructional leadership, special education, and whole-child development.
- Annual professional learning builds leadership capacity and improves academic, special education, and student well-being outcomes.
- Additional supports include site visits, leadership conferences, and individualized coaching as needed.

Targeted Support: TSI, ATS, & CSI Schools

- In addition to standard support, LSSU CSO offers targeted help to Partner Districts and Targeted Support Schools to accelerate academic progress and promote equitable outcomes.
- Support focuses on building capacity, not evaluation.
- Additional supports include CSO participation in partnership meetings, individualized coaching, and funding for partnership implementation.
- School support awards provide funding for partnership academies to fulfill their partnership agreements. The LSSU Charter School Office used such an award to help fund DSLA administrators' participation in the National Charter School Institute's LEAD# program.

LSSU Updated School Index Fall 2025

In the Fall of 2025, the MDE Office of Partnership Districts released an updated partnership list.

We are pleased to announce that Detroit Service Learning's Oak Park Academy has been removed from the MDE partnership list.

Charlton Heston is no longer identified as Targeted for Support and Improvement.

Both of these schools have no MDE Classification, requiring no specific state-required plan, and will receive universal support.

We are also pleased to announce that no new schools from our portfolio have been identified for additional support.

She is a Concord Boyne alumna, a Lake Superior State University alumna, and the parent of two current Concord Boyne students, and now serves the Academy in her capacity as a Board member.

Note: iCademy was identified as a CSI school in 2016–2017 due to a reported graduation rate below 67%, later attributed to student tracking issues rather than performance. At the time, proficiency was already high (74%), with only a modest decline in math the following year (60%). The CSI (Partnership) designation is, therefore, misleading; iCademy is a high-performing school.

Academic Highlights

- 70% of cohort students met the achievement target in math compared to 63% of non-cohort students on NWEA MAP.
- 70% of cohort students met the achievement target in reading compared to 60% of non-cohort students on NWEA MAP.
- The percentage of students advanced or proficient overall (all subjects combined) was greater than the state average on the M-Step or state assessment by 9%.

Additional Highlights

- Recognized by Niche as the best online high school, charter school, and public school in Michigan.
- 100% of the Instructional Staff are Certified and Highly Qualified in their content area
- 25 iCademy high school students attended the LSSU CSO GLSW Event in October 2025
- School leader Reid Nicholson was recognized by the National School Institute for his leadership traits.
- The Academy upgraded its website and enhanced parents' abilities to directly engage in daily learning.
- High school students, for a second year in a row, will have an opportunity to participate in a Capstone Trip out of the United States.
